Great Plants for your Garden, by month

JANUARY

Phormium 'Yellow Wave'

Betula utilis var. jacquemontii

<u>Phyllostachys vivax f. aureocaulis</u> a **bamboo** with bright yellow stems. Clump forming, but is shallow rooting, so is easy to stop it spreading by digging round the clump each year and removing the rhizomes.

Heuchera sanguinea 'Geisha's Fan' Keep plants as dry as possible.

Hedera helix 'Chester'

Helleborus × ballardiae 'Snow Dance' the flowers face forward on erect stems, rather than drooping.

FEBRUARY

<u>Crocus 'Ladykiller'</u> unusual purple flush under petals.

Iris 'Katharine Hodgkin'

Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Postill' Fabulous fragrance.

Daphnes are temperamental, thriving in some gardens and not in others.

<u>Cyclamen coum</u> Good in dry shade, even under evergreen trees.

Helleborus orientalis 'Queen of Spades'

Galanthus elwesii Very large variety of **snowdrop**.

Bergenia 'Wintermärchen'

Narcissus pseudonarcissus The wild daffodil – improves with age – spreads – self-seeding.

MARCH

for the conservatory:

Matthiola incana Stock – grow from seed. Select seedlings with lime green foliage as these are doubles – the more healthy looking darker green seedlings will have single flowers.

Heliotropium arborescens 'Reva' long stemmed, so works well as cut flower.

<u>Pelargonium 'Sweet Mimosa'</u> Excellent now for its fragrant foliage. Flowers throughout summer.

Euphorbia characias

Ribes sanguineum 'Elkington's White' Very elegant.

Pulmonaria 'Blue Ensign'

Erythronium dens-canis } Can be difficult to find right spot - both need damp

Fritillaria meleagris } shade, even suited to north facing sites.

<u>Cynara cardunculus</u> (cardoon) Good for cut foliage.

<u>Lunaria 'Corfu Blue'</u> variety of honesty, differentiated by the distinct blue colour of its flowers.

Libertia ixioides 'Goldfinger' Warm, free-draining site.

APRIL

Tulips – It is worthwhile paying more for larger bulbs that will be more perennial – recommended <u>Bloms Bulbs</u>.

Tulip 'Black Hero' paeony-flowered type.
Tulip 'Chery!'paeony-flowered type.
Tulip 'El Nino'contrasts very well with Euphorbia characias.
Heliophila longifolia grow from seed – put in twigs to support them as they grow.
<u>Schizanthus – Dr Badgers Mix</u> grow from seed.
Pelargonium ardens
Pelargonium 'Splendide'
Anthriscus sylvestris 'Ravenswing' form of cow parsley with very dark stems.
Lamprocapnos spectabilis 'Alba' white bleeding heart - good against north-facing wall.
Lunaria 'Chedglow' Honesty with darker foliage.
Malus 'Bramley's Seedling' whilst this apple is grown principally for its fruit, it also has very attractive blossom.
MAY
Kolkwitzia amabilis 'Pink Cloud' beauty bush
<u>Mespilus germanica</u> – medlar
Olearia stellulata from New Zealand – needs hot, dry location.
Allium jesdianum ' <i>Purple King</i> '
<u>Eremurus himalaicus</u> foxtail lily – tall, good for hot dry border – use gravel to improve drainage.
Persicaria bistorta 'Superba' cut and it keeps producing flowers.
<u>Geum 'Prinses Juliana'</u>
Polygonatum - Solomon's Seal
Trollius 'Cheddar'
Iris 'Stepping Out'
Iris 'Jane Phillips' very fragrant.
Iris sibirica 'Silver Edge' largest-flowered Siberian iris.
JUNE
Rose 'Veilchenblau' rambler – only flowers once a year. Not as vigorous as many ramblers.
Rose 'Queen of Sweden' floribunda.
Papaver somniferum 'Lauren's Grape' single-flowered poppy.
Campanula 'Kent Belle'
Geranium pratense 'Wisley Blue' flowers very early.
Crambe cordifolia good for back of border.
Sanguisorba menziesii glaucous foliage; flowers on top of long stems give transparent effect.
Gillenia trifoliata needs moisture and some shade.
Valeriana officianalis
<u>Salvia 'Caradonna'</u> dark stems.
Begonia luxurians not resistant to frost.
<i>Euphorbia 'Excalibur'</i> 4 ft high with acid-yellow flowers.

JULY

Helianthus 'Ms Mars' dwarf sunflower with unusual colouring.

<u>Erigeron annuus</u> will seed itself around.

Nigella papillosa 'Delft Blue' flowers bigger than normal love-in-a-mist, with very big seed pods.

<u>Dahlia 'Gwyneth'</u> for dahlias in general, "live-heading", i.e. cutting flowers when they are at their prime, is much better than dead-heading – following flowers come more quickly and better quality.

<u>Achillea 'Terracotta'</u> attractive changing shades as flowers age.

Coreopsis 'Roulette'

Achillea 'Summerwine'

<u>Alstroemeria 'Pandora'</u> rather than cutting flowers, pull out the stems – the new buds will respond better.

<u>Penstemon 'Raven'</u> old, reliable cultivar.

<u>Limonium platyphyllum</u> coastal plant – used to dry exposed conditions.

<u>Scabiosa 'Black Knight'</u> must be dead-headed – it will then keep on flowering.

Helenium 'Sahin's Early Flowerer' one of the earliest flowering Heleniums – will then keep on flowering.

Good annual climbers:

Petunia 'Tidal Wave Red Velour'

Thunbergia 'Spanish Eyes' "black-eyed Susan" with unusual peach colour – grows to 10 ft.

AUGUST

Helianthus 'Alchemy' silvery hairy foliage, unusual for a sunflower.

Helianthus 'Vanilla Ice' a branching sunflower.

<u>Zinnia 'Benary's Giant Wine'</u> April sowings look good in summer but are flagging by September; for later flowering, sow direct in early June.

Helenium 'Rauchtopas'

Vernonia arkansana 'Mammuth' grows to 6 or 7 ft.

Helenium 'Riverton Beauty' Tall.

<u>Gladioli</u> will flower roughly 100 days after the corm has been planted. **Dwarf gladioli** look more comfortable with other plants in a garden setting than the very tall ones.

<u>Gladiolus 'Bimbo'</u> - big and bright.

Gladiolus 'Sylvia' - dwarf

Gladiolus 'Violetta' - dwarf

Canna x iridiflora

Dahlia 'Black Jack' very dark flowers – also has dark foliage.

<u>Galtonia candicans</u> white pendulous bell-shaped flowers.

Anethum graveolens dill - flowers August-September.

SEPTEMBER

Vigna caracalla "Snail vine" – very easy to grow from seed.
Ipomoea lobata 'Citronella' tall twining climber.
Malus 'Red Sentinel' crab apple with striking red fruit.
Malus 'Golden Hornet' crab apple that is a good pollinator for many apple trees.
Miscanthus ' <i>Flamingo</i> ' grass that grows to 5 ft. Very delicate appearance.

Symphyotrichum 'Little Carlow' pale purple **Michaelmas daisy**.

<u>Symphyotrichum novae-angliae 'Rubinschatz'</u> an American **aster**, which are taller and more resistant to mildew than the European asters (*novae-belgiae*)

Leucanthemum serotina white daisy flowers October – November. Grows to 6 ft.

OCTOBER

<u>Callicarpa bodinieri 'Profusion'</u> beauty berry - need 2 or 3 plants in a group so they can cross-pollinate.

<u>Abutilon 'Wakehurst'</u> wall shrub, but needs to be sheltered.

Alstroemeria 'Indian Summer' bronze foliage.

Leonotis leonurus plant in a sheltered part of the garden or in container that can be put in sheltered position.

Dahlia 'Karma Choc' one of the "Karma" cultivars, bred specifically for the cut flower market.

<u>Rosa</u> '*Fru Dagmar Hastrup*' a rugosa rose. Lower part of plant is bare, so grows oregano underneath.

Salvia × jamensis 'Raspberry Royale'

Tricyrtis formosana Toad lily.

<u>Arundo donax 'Peppermint Stick'</u> giant reed grass.

Symphyotrichum 'Lady in Black' aster with small white flowers against very dark foliage on purple stems.

NOVEMBER

Pennisetum setaceum 'Purpureum' hardy grass – flowers November-December. Does not seed around.

Rosa moyesii 'Geranium' large red hips follow the bright red single flowers.

<u>Prunus incisa 'Kojo-no-mai'</u> good for foliage in November and flowers in March.

Euonymus hamiltonianus 'Coral Charm'

<u>Cortaderia selloana 'Evita'</u> dwarf pampas grass.

Miscanthus nepalensis hardy grass – lovely seed heads that last through winter.

Acer griseum paper-bark maple.

<u>Acer 'Gingerbread'</u> very good autumn foliage.

DECEMBER

× Amarine tubergenii 'Belladiva' cross between Amaryllis and Nerine – hot, dry position;

good for south facing wall.

<u>Camellia sasanqua 'Crimson King'</u> needs a sheltered position in the garden.

Panicum virgatum 'Kupferhirse' switch grass.

<u>Cornus sanguinea 'Anny's Winter Orange'</u> new **dogwood** cultivar – colour brighter than 'Midwinter Fire'.

Lunaria rediviva perennial form of **honesty**.

Betula albosinensis 'Bowling Green'

Hamamelis x intermedia 'Robert' witch-hazel with coppery-orange blooms.

Mahonia x media 'Buckland'

Asplenium evergreen fern.
